
#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

#### INDOOR PROGRAMS

The facility is wheelchair accessible.

#### Directions to the Whitney Center (WC)

From I-95 North or South: Exit onto I-91 North in New Haven. Take Exit 6 (Willow St.). At end of ramp turn right onto Willow and proceed to the end (Whitney Ave.). Turn right onto Whitney and go approximately 4 miles. Turn left onto Putnam Avenue. From I-91 South: Take Exit 6 (Willow St.) in New Haven. At end of ramp, turn right onto Willow and proceed to the end (Whitney Ave.). Turn right onto Whitney and go approximately 4 miles. Turn left onto Putnam Avenue. From Wilbur Cross (Rte. 15) northbound: Take Exit 61 (Whitney Ave.). Turn left at end of ramp, go 2.4 mi., turn right onto Putnam.

<u>From Wilbur Cross (Rte. 15) northbound:</u> Take Exit 61 (Whitney Ave). Turn left at end of ramp, go 2.4 mi., turn right onto Putnam <u>From Wilbur Cross (Rte. 15) southbound:</u> Take Exit 61 (Whitney Ave. New Haven). At end of ramp go right. Proceed to Putnam.

On Putnam go approximately .7 mi, (3 traffic lights) and turn right onto Leeder Hill (ATT bldg is at that intersection). Go .6 mi. on Leeder Hill to the South Entrance (big sign) of WC on the left. Turn in and take an immediate left into a raised parking area. Meeting is in the South Building, accessed via the main door of the portico that is in view from the parking lot. Turn right down the hallway. The Cultural Arts Center is a short distance on the left.

## Thursday, September 13, 2012 — Sam Fried Eastern Canada: Journey of Discovery

Explore Canada's Maritime Provinces as Sam recounts his 6,000+ mile trip by car and boat through that beautiful and remote part of North America. We'll check out the birds and other wildlife as we visit New Brunswick and circumnavigate Cape Breton Island of Nova Scotia. We'll cross the Northumberland Strait to the magnificent and stark scenery of Newfoundland, with its craggy headlands, rocky seacoast, and fascinating history. The wildlife in this little known province is key, as we'll discover from Sam's great photos. Then we continue the tour on the new 700-mile dirt road that circles Labrador through the endless boreal forest. We end the journey in Quebec with its more civilized delights. Sam, an avid longtime birder and photographer, is founder of Flights of Fancy Adventures, a birding, photography, natural history, and golf travel company. Sam has published many photos, articles, and books. His North American bird list has 740 species, 722 of them photographed. A recent 7,000-mile trip from FL through the Midwest and on to CT, got him 320 species.

#### Thursday, October 11, 2012 — Robert Craig Connecticut Habitat Atlas and the Green Corridor

Our speaker this evening is Robert Craig, General Director of Bird Conservation Research (BCR), a nonprofit foundation based in Putnam, CT. The group provides original scientific data for driving conservation action by users as diverse as land trusts, biology educators, planning and zoning commissions and even the National Park Service. Of special interest to us is that the foundation's focus is on the most diverse wildlife group: birds and the habitats that support them. BCR has conducted a Forest Bird Survey of Southern New England. This summer-winter quantitative survey of the populations, distributions, and habitat preferences of forest birds in Connecticut and Rhode Island was conducted along 148 transects and logged the occurrence of more than 50,000 individuals of nearly 100 species. It concurrently made nearly 18,000 measurements on habitats. Robert Craig is perfectly suited for his job—he has studied birds for 40 years. Educated at Rutgers and UConn, he focused on wildlife management and ornithology and earned a PhD in zoology from UConn. His research has led to nearly 100 contributions to the scientific literature.

## Jamaica Bay National Wildlife Refuge, Queens, NY Saturday, August 18, 2012, 7:00 am

#### **Central CT Birding Tour Trip Report**

On Saturday, July 7th, ten club members went north to visit a couple of fine birding locations along the CT River corridor. Our first and main stop was at Northwest Park in Windsor. The park is large, at almost 500 acres, and is comprised of large fields, woodlands, and swamps. The park borders a wide portion of the Farmington River. It boasts a nature center, animal barn, and tobacco museum (the fields are converted tobacco fields from years ago). We were surprised and pleased to find that we had the park virtually to ourselves. We started out by hiking through the fields. We saw and heard several Indigo Buntings

and Field Sparrows along the way. We also saw Northern Roughwinged Swallows, Eastern Kingbirds, American Goldfinches, and Eastern Bluebirds in the fields. Grasshopper Sparrows have nested in these fields in recent years, although we didn't see or hear any on our walk. As we reached the woodland edge, we saw or heard a number of species, including Scarlet Tanager, Great Crested Flycatcher, Eastern Wood-Pewee, and Indigo Bunting



Wood Thrush. In a small brushy field Photo by Bill Batsford in the northeast corner of the park, we

saw Prairie Warblers and Eastern Towhees. From the north end of the park, we walked back down to the south end, taking trails through the woods along the river, and by the swamps. We didn't see a lot of birds on this portion of our walk, but did get good looks at a male Scarlet Tanager. We saw a total of 40 species at the park (the full report is on ebird). We took advantage of the air-conditioned nature center to cool off, and enjoyed the exhibits in the process, and ate an early lunch on one of the picnic tables by the museum.

Our second and last stop of the day was at Station 43 in South Windsor. We went with the plan to stay until we saw a Least Bittern. We didn't have to wait long. Within minutes of our arrival, one flew a short distance from one part of the marsh to another. We didn't all get to see it at that moment, but a few minutes later, the bird flew a longer distance past us and we all got to see it then. Other birds of note that we saw at the marsh were: Green Heron, Great Blue Heron, Marsh Wren, and Swamp Sparrow. We finished the hot day around noon, pleased with the birds we saw and the scenic locations we had visited. We will make this trip again next year, going to the locations that promise to be the most productive and interesting.

#### **Birds in Words Trip Report**

On June 13th The New Haven Bird Club Book Group, Birds in Words, had a wonderful walk at Trail Wood and for the most part the rain held off. Thirteen members of the Book Group who had read *A Naturalist Buys an Old Farm* by Edwin Way Teale had a delightful walk on the property in Hampton, CT with CT Audubon leader, Andy Rzeznikiewicz and Terry LaVoie Trail Wood Friend/expert. We explored the house, writing cabin, summer house and other areas all mentioned by Teale in his wonder-



ful book and made lists of ferns, wildflowers and the birds we saw on the trails and in the fields. It was a delightful day, and we thank our leaders for their guidance.

In his book Teale mentions finding 26 of the 53 known native Connecticut ferns in and about Trail Wood. We were fortunate enough to find and identify 11 Ferns: Bracken Fern, Christmas Fern, Cinnamon Fern, Hay Scented Fern, Imperial Fern, Interrupted Fern, Lady Fern, New York Fern, Ostrich Fern, Royal Fern, Sensitive Fern. There were wild flowers everywhere we

looked plus some lovely cultivated flowers in the gardens. We saw more than 25 species of flowers.

We saw 35 species of birds: Wood Duck, Great Blue Heron,

Mourning Dove, Ruby-throated Hummingbird, Downy Woodpecker, Piliated Wood pecker, Eastern Wood Pewee, Least Flycatcher, Eastern Phoebe, Red-eyed Vireo, American Crow, Tree Swallow, Black-capped chickadee, Tufted Titmouse, White-breasted Nuthatch, House Wren, Blue-gray Gnatcatcher, Eastern Bluebird, Veery, Wood Thrush, Gray Catbird, Cedar Waxwing, Blue-winged Warbler, Yellow Warbler, Chestnut-sided Warbler, American Redstart, Ovenbird, Common Yel-

lowthroat, Hooded Warbler, Scarlet Tanager, Eastern Towhee, Indigo Blunting, Red-winged Blackbird, Baltimore Oriole, American Goldfinch.



#### MEET THE BOARD

#### Corrie Folsom-O'Keefe: Education Chair

Corrie Folsom-O'Keefe is NHBC's Education Chair, a position that fits right into her near-lifelong interest and work in a wide range of conservation and birdrelated activities. Acquainted with birds through her nature-loving parents, Corrie had her birding fate sealed in college when a friend invited her on a spring bird walk at the Boston Gardens. A wave of migrating birds, topped by magnificent views of Blackburnians, opened her eyes "to the wonderful world of warblers and the joys of birding," as she puts it.

After graduating from Boston University in 1999 with a degree in biology, Corrie embarked on an energetic series of jobs and experiences both near and far, and both paid and volunteer. She spent time in the Eastern Sierras of CA employed by the Mono Lake Committee in its

efforts, in the end successful, to protect the lake, which provides a critical habitat for nesting migratory birds. Corrie stayed out West to volunteer during Great White Shark season on the Farrallon Islands off the coast of California. She was stationed in a lighthouse looking for sharks or out helping to video tape the awesome creatures in action, but Corrie also got to band birds and keep a log of the migrating passerines. She found the sharks "pretty cool," but says it was the birds she enjoyed most. For two summers somewhere in between her other jobs, she was a Girl Scout counselor in Alaska, honing her teaching skills and travelling widely to enjoy that state's wildlife and natural beauty.

A Connecticut native raised in Naugatuck, Corrie returned home periodically and at one point worked at Derby's Kellogg Environmental Center before heading to Belize to volunteer with the Peregrine Fund on a project to hack (reintroduce captive born birds) Harpy Eagles. Her next stop was Nova Scotia, where she volunteered for the Atlantic Bird Observatory, banding birds on Bon Portage Island.

After about 5 years of such travels, among a variety of other stops along the way, Corrie turned to settling down—more or less. She returned to CT and worked at the Nature Center at Hammonasset, then spent 3 years at West Hartford's Children's Museum where she used her science background and teaching skills to create and teach a number of programs. During this time Corrie also earned a Master's Degree in biology from Connecticut College and subsequently was employed by Yale to study the role of mammals and birds in the transmission of diseases. Last year Corrie took the job she now holds:

Coordinator of the Audubon CT Important Bird Area Program. But she still fits in a variety of other activities. She's Education Specialist for Quinnipiac Valley Audubon as well as co-compiler of its Christmas Bird Count. She still volunteers, as she has for years, in the bird banding program at the Milford Coastal Center and has participated in the CT DEEP Hawk, Nightjar, Chimney Swift, and Owl Surveys. And last but not least, Corrie found time 3 years ago to acquire a husband and pre-teen stepson. Her husband Dan, a union steamfitter, isn't a birder but enjoys the outdoors and occasionally joins her on bird walks. They share an interest in music. He plays guitar and banjo and performs in 2 bands: blue grass and rock; she is learning to play the mandolin

Corrie, a Meriden resident for 6 years, is testimony to the fun and satisfaction to be had in consistently birding one's own patch. She's dedicated to visiting Hanover Pond, the Quinnipiac River Gorge Trail, and the old Meriden Dump, all within a mile of her home. Between those places and her own yard, she has a list of 135 species. She's slowly working on getting years of all her records into the eBird database. Asked about favorite birds, Corrie says that any bird she has studied intensively has a special place in her heart. She named Prairie Warbler, the subject of her Master's Thesis, and American Robin, which she studied in her work at Yale. Her response to "most memorable birding experience" is simple but paints a striking picture: "A Snowy Owl at Long Beach on a cold January morning. It was just after sunrise, it was freezing and it was just me and the owl in the parking lot."

Seemingly having endless energy, Corrie also enjoys drawing, painting, gardening, writing letters (the good old-fashioned snail-mail variety), and tending to her pet cat.

Corrie's enthusiasm, imagination, and organizational skills are genuine assets to NHBC, which she joined 3 years ago. As Education Chair she has started a new series of field trips, Family Bird Walks, an important step in the Club's ongoing effort to reach a wider and especially a younger audience. Corrie would like to expand the program and invites anyone interested in helping to contact her.
