# **Indoor Programs**

#### Please check the NHBC website and newsletter for updated information before planning to attend any event.

Indoor programs start in September and are held on the second Thursday of the month. There are no indoor programs in June, July, or August. This year, we plan to resume meeting at the Whitney Center's Cultural Arts Center, 200 Leeder Hill Drive, Hamden CT 06517. The facility is wheelchair accessible. The social half-hour begins at 7 p.m.; the meeting and program begin at 7:30 p.m. and end about 9 p.m.

#### Some indoor programs are held only as a virtual, online presentation and are noted as such in the descriptions.

#### The Whitney Center

We hold our monthly meetings in the Whitney Center's Cultural Arts Center, in the South Building, 200 Leeder Hill Drive, Hamden CT. Enter via the main door of the portico at the front of the building. Turn right down the hallway. The Cultural Arts Center is a short distance on the left.

**PARKING:** Enter the Whitney Center's South Entrance, marked with a sign. Either make an immediate left into the raised parking lot (park *only* in the upper level and *only* in unnumbered spaces) or follow the main driveway past the front entrance of the building. At the stop sign, turn right into the visitor and employee parking area and walk back from there to the front entrance.

#### Thursday, December 14, 2023 – Frank Gallo South Texas Specialties Trip Report (Virtual only)

Join Sam Merker, postdoctoral researcher at the University of Connecticut, for an engaging presentation on the captivating life history of the American Bittern. Discover insights into current research, including what researchers hope to uncover using data from the Connecticut Bird Atlas.

#### Thursday, February 8, 2024 – Diego Calderon Birds of Columbia (Virtual only)

Embark on a virtual tour of Colombia's bird species with biologist and tour guide Diego Calderon. He has more than a decade of experience leading bird tours. His adventurous expeditions have taken him to remote areas, including the Pirre and Santa Marta Mountains, where he captured remarkable photographs and voice recordings of elusive birds like the Blue-bearded Helmetcrest and Santa Marta Wren. Diego's expertise extends beyond Colombia; he has guided bird tours in several other countries and has a keen interest in digiscoping and in wild orchid photography. We will not be meeting in person for this presentation.

# **Outdoor Programs**

The future course of the coronavirus pandemic may continue to affect our schedule of events. Our first priority is protecting the health and well-being of our members and the general public, and it may become necessary to adjust or cancel some events. The recommendations and policies of local, state, and national health authorities will guide all decisions about our schedule. Please check the NHBC website and newsletter for updated information before planning to attend any event.

**Cancellation Policy:** Inclement weather or other emergencies may cancel a field trip. Check the NHBC website *or contact the leader of the trip directly* if you have any questions about a possible cancellation.

Birders of all levels are welcome on all field trips, and every effort is made to help beginners. If you are new to birding or have any special needs, be sure to let the leader know. The Club welcomes everyone regardless of age, race or ethnicity, sex, gender identification, sexual orientation, or national origin. The ending times of walks are approximate.

More details and/or updates on these trips will be given at the indoor meetings. Please check the NHBC website and newsletter periodically for updated information on all programs. **Scheduled events may need to be changed or canceled** and events may be added during the year. *Contact trip leaders directly if you have questions about any of their trips*.

The New Haven Bird Club does not charge any fees for its outdoor programs, but participants are responsible for the cost of their food, transportation, and entrance fees (where charged), unless the Club makes prior arrangements. Carpooling is usually encouraged to avoid parking problems at some destinations and to promote conservation of natural resources, but check current coronavirus recommendations.

#### **NHBC Conservation and Education Activities**

The New Haven Bird Club routinely works to preserve and restore bird populations and their habitats and to provide opportunities for learning about birds, where to see them, and how to help ensure their future. Additional environmentally-focused, family-friendly walks may be planned and posted on the NHBC website.

The NHBC has been developing relationships with local public schools and camps to encourage children to embrace birding. We view this activity as directly connected to our Club objectives, and usually present a very basic birding skills class followed by a nearby bird walk. The Education Chair also organizes the Club's representation at various public events throughout the year. Volunteers to help at events are always welcome! #### First Wednesday Walk: Hammonasset Beach State Park, Madison

At any time of year, Hammonasset is a true gem. Enjoy a midweek trip to explore this birding hotspot for fall migrants. The varied habitat attracts shorebirds, waterfowl, raptors, and songbirds. East Rock Park is deservedly famous for its diversity of colorful neotropical migrants in spring. Early winter brings its own avian delights to the park. We look and/or listen for ducks, hawks, woodpeckers, corvids, wrens, kinglets, thrushes, finches, and sparrows. Expected highlights are mousy Winter Wrens, kronking Common Ravens, and posturing Peregrine Falcons. Meet at the Eli Whitney Museum parking lot, 915 Whitney Avenue, Hamden. #### White Memorial Foundation: Birding and Tracking, Litchfield

White Memorial Foundation is a 4,000-acre nature preserve with mature deciduous and evergreen forests, as well as fields of tall grass, weeds, and shrubs that are managed for various stages of succession. One of the best birding sites in the state and an Important Bird Area, White Memorial has approximately 35 miles of woodland roads, trails, and boardwalks. We could observe a variety of sparrows, woodpeckers, possibly winter finches, owls and more. We will be joined by experienced trackers Christin Arnini and Gail Cameron. Mammals such as otters, beavers, bobcats, foxes, deer, coyotes, and mink are active in the winter and leave clues about their travels and ways of surviving this most difficult time of the year. # **Trip Reports**

#### October First Wednesday Walk: Lighthouse Point Park, New Haven Trip Report

The group gathered at the hawkwatch at 7:30 a.m. on Wednesday, October 4<sup>th</sup>. There was a nice turnout. At the hawkwatch, three Killdeer landed in the field, and there was a steady stream of Tree Swallows passing by all morning. Cedar Waxwings, and a few Bobolinks and Purple Finches were seen and heard flying over, but the hawks weren't flying so we took a walk to the beach through the hackberry grove. The trees were full of Palm Warblers, both Western and Eastern, Savannah Sparrows, and quite a few Eastern Phoebes.

At the beach, we were treated to nice views of a Common Loon close to shore, all the expected gulls, and quite a few Laughing Gulls streaming into the harbor. We circled back past the lighthouse and continued over to the west woodlot where we were greeted by a Yellow-bellied Sapsucker in the tupelo tree at the edge of the parking lot. Although it was quiet in the woods, we managed to find several Ruby-crowned and Goldencrowned Kinglets, a large flock of White-throated Sparrows, White-breasted Nuthatches, and we saw five species of woodpeckers. A Common Raven flew over, as well.

Walking back along the entrance road we encountered more Palm Warblers, Phoebes, and the first Dark-eyed Junco of the season feeding on the lawns.

There was a little flurry of activity upon our return to the hawkwatch, and before we finished up, we'd tallied a Peregrine Falcon, 2 Cooper's Hawks, a Sharp-shinned Hawk, a close Northern Harrier, and a couple of Osprey. We ended with 47 species for the day.

The New Haven Bird Club's November 1st Wednesday Walk was postponed to Friday November 3rd due to stormy weather. Friday turned out to be a glorious warm and sunny autumn day with very little wind. Our 21 participants saw and /or heard 64 species during the walk.

We had a varied mix of birds including some newly arrived winter ducks and at least 20 Common Loons on Long Island Sound. One of the parks' resident Bald Eagle pair, which have already begun adding sticks to their nest, made a brief appearance. Everyone had excellent views of the Vesper Sparrow which was spotted by Jalna Jaeger at the model airplane field, and a Blue-headed Vireo was an unexpected treat to see at this time of year. Thanks to all for attending and making the walk memorable.

#### **Cheshire Hotspots Trip Report**



Fourteen birders visited Broad Brook Reservoir and Fresh Meadows for the New Haven Bird Club's annual Cheshire Hotspots trip on Sunday, November 5<sup>th</sup>. The birds on Broad Brook Reservoir can be viewed from several locations along the southern edge of this

waterbody. Each year in late October and early November, Broad Brook is a staging area for hundreds of migrating Ruddy Ducks, as well as many other dabbling and diving ducks. Thirty-eight bird species were observed this year, highlighted by eight species of ducks: Wood Duck, American Wigeon, Mallard, Green-winged Teal, Ring-necked Duck, Bufflehead,

Hooded Merganser, and Ruddy Duck. Also, we observed Piedbilled Grebe, Double-crested Cormorants forming a tight line as they made foraging dives, an adult Bald Eagle (a Broad Brook nester), Yellow-bellied Sapsucker, both kinglet species, and an estimated 1,000 Common

Grackles initially moving along the western edge of the reservoir, then moving out en masse.

At Fresh Meadows, where there is a small parking lot off Cook Hill Road, we observed 27 species, including both soaring vultures, an interacting aerial pair of Sharp-shinned Hawks, Ruby-crowned Kinglet, Eastern Bluebird, Cedar Waxwing, a female Purple Finch, Swamp Sparrow, a reasonably cooperative Orange-crowned Warbler, and Yellow-rumped Warbler. Fresh Meadows often requires boots to bird comfortably, but this year most trails were pretty dry, with the exception of a few deep puddles. Our eBird posts for the two sites benefited from photos taken by Chris Howe and Celeste Echlin.

#### **Branford Supply Ponds Trip Report**

The rescheduled bird walk to Branford Supply Ponds on November 12<sup>th</sup> was worth the wait. Ten participants got good looks at a Great Horned Owl that flew in and perched on a branch. Even though we agreed that this was the bird of the day, the following took second place: Palm Warbler, Ringednecked Duck, American Coot, Pied-billed Grebe, singing Hooded Mergansers, Pileated Woodpecker, Hairy Woodpecker, Purple Finch, Hermit Thrush, both Kinglets, Yellow-bellied Sapsucker, Mallard-Black Duck hybrid with female, and let's not forget the other raptors, Bald Eagle, Red-tailed and Sharpshinned Hawks. We had 38 species in all.

# **Connecticut Migratory Bird Conservation Stamp**

#### Your Stamp of Approval

Did you know that over 3,800 acres of critical wetland habitat has been restored and protected in Connecticut? This achievement was only made possible by the supporters and contributors to the Connecticut Migratory Bird Conservation Stamp Program, which is the only dedicated source of funding for wetland protection in our state. Since its creation in 1993, the Program has contributed and leveraged over \$4 million towards wetland protection and restoration.



- 99% of every dollar of each Stamp purchased goes toward protecting and enhancing homes for migratory birds, like the American black duck, red-winged blackbird, and great blue heron.
- 1% helps produce the beautiful stamps.
- Healthy wetlands benefit over 20% of all the wildlife species in Connecticut, including painted and spotted turtles, pickerel frogs, and all 12 of the salamander species that call Connecticut home.

The incredible image that graces each year's Connecticut stamp is painted by a local kindergarten through 12th grade student that competes in the annual CT Junior Duck Stamp Art Contest, where participants learn about wetlands and conservation and explore the natural world. The talented winner's painting represents Connecticut in the National Junior Duck Stamp Contest and is featured on the Connecticut Migratory Bird Conservation Stamp for a year.

# NHBC Winter Feeder Report 2023-2024 End of Week 2



This year we started with 20 surveyors, 3 via Postal Mail and 16 via email and me. We are located all over New Haven County with one surveyor in Fairfield County and two in Middlesex County. We have

finished the first 2 weeks of the survey with 11 of 22 surveyors reporting. 10 Email surveyors have reported out of 17 (the others send their reports in after the  $5^{\text{th}}$  week). We have 3 surveyors that report by Postal Mail.

At the end of week 1 I received this question from one of my surveyors: "Has anyone seen any American Goldfinch?" In the first two weeks of the survey, I did not see any, nor did half of the other reporting surveyors. Amy Hopkins had 8 (week 1) and 13 (week 2). The other 4 reporting surveyors had 1 to 3 (week 1) and 0 to 3 (week 2).

I have also not seen any Northern Cardinals at my feeders nor in my neighborhood, and I normally see 3 to 4 all year long. I wonder what is going on. We will see what the numbers look like after week 5 when I have all my surveyors reporting.

We saw 21 of 22 of the Common Species, 8 of 12 Semi-Common, 4 of 42 Uncommon, and 0 Waterfowl. Of the 21 Common Winter Species, the maximum number seen in any one week is 7 (week 1) for Dark-eyed Juncos, seen by Tim and Kate Rodgers and 6 (week 1) for White-throated Sparrows, seen by Laurie Reynolds. 1 Purple Finch (week 1) was seen by Dewitt Allen.

Other species of note seen: Semi Common Category: Chipping Sparrow, Eastern Blue Bird, Northern Flicker, Northern Mockingbird, Purple Finch, Red-winged Blackbird, Rock Dove, Sharp-shinned hawk. Uncommon Category: Brown Creeper, Cedar Waxwing, Golden-crowned Kinglet and Raven. No Waterfowls have been seen yet.

There is still time to join. The survey runs from Monday, October 30, 2023, through Sunday, March 31, 2024. It is a weekly survey, but the number you report can be from a few minutes on one day or from many sightings on several days of the week. It is very flexible. There will be 2 Session this year due to the increasing presence of Black Bears and their taking down of feeders.

The First Session started on Monday, October 30, 2023, and will finish on Sunday, March 31, 2024. This is for those who have not had any reports of bears in their area and is 22 Weeks long.

The Second Session will start on Monday, December 4, 2023, and end on Sunday, March 3, 2024. This is for those who fear bears attacking their feeders. During this period the bears should be in hibernation and no threat to the feeders. It will be 13 weeks long.

We have 3 types of Surveyors:

1. Postal Surveyors: Those who use Postal Mail to send and receive. I send you the forms via Postal Mail and you send them back via Postal Mail. No email capability.

 Email surveyors: Those who use email to send and receive.
Email/Postal surveyors: Those of you who can receive email but cannot download the forms and print them or cannot use email to send the data back to me. I send the forms to you via Postal Mail and you send them back via Postal Mail. All other communication is via email.

In each cell, only record the highest number of individual birds seen of that species in that week. For example: for the daily count if you see 5 Juncos at 8:00 AM, 10 at noon, and 6 at 3:00 PM, count 10 Juncos as your count for the day. For the Weekly count, if the daily counts are 10, 2, and 15, for the same species, the count for the Week is 15 and not 27. In cases where individual birds can be differentiated, record the total counted for both sexes for the week. For example, if you have a female Cardinal on one day of the week and a male on another, then record 2 for the week, since you know that 2 different individuals were seen.
